TIPS TO CELEBRATE HALLOWEEN

If you haven't experienced Halloween in the U.S. yet, you're definitely in for a treat! Halloween is on Thursday, October 31st and on this night, it's estimated that around 170 million Americans carve pumpkins, hand out candy, and put on their best costumes to celebrate this tradition. Here's our guide to getting into the Halloween spirit!

TRICK OR TREATING

This Halloween tradition is typically observed by children. Children dress up in a costume of their choice, and go door-to-door with homeowners giving them sweets and chocolate treats. The children ask "trick or treat?" when the homeowners answer the door. While you may not see any trick or treating on campus, it's a massive part of Halloween culture. If you live off campus, consider buying candy to hand out to your trick-or-treating neighbors. If you will not be home, we recommend to turn off your front light so people know you're not there.

SCIRY MOVIES

A HILLOWEEN COSTUMES

However, more recently, costumes have widened to include characters from popular culture, fictional characters, celebrities and general archetypes such as cowboys, princesses and ninjas.

DECORITIONS

You'll notice around Halloween that a lot of decorations will appear around campus and around town. Houses, schools and shops will deck their properties out in a variety of Halloween decorations. Expect skeletons, cobwebs, pumpkins, ghosts and a whole host of other spooky decorations.

DUMPKIN CARVING

Carving pumpkins into jack-o'-lanterns is a common practice on Halloween. You cut the top off the pumpkin, scoop out the middle, carve a face, image or word into the pumpkin and pop a candle in the pumpkin to watch it glow.

Join Sanctuary Kitchen for a film screening of WE ARE NOT PRINCESSES. This film offers a unique peek into the private lives of women who have survived unspeakable sorrow, yet blossom through the healing power of art. During a theater workshop in a Lebanese refugee camp, four Syrian women discover they have a lot in common with the ancient Greek heroine, Antigone, and experience freedoms forbidden in their homeland.

Following the film, there will be a talk-back moderated by Elise Morrison, PhD, Associate Professor Yale Theater Studies, with film director Bridgette Auger; IRIS -Integrated Refugee and Immigrant Services, and Syrian Sanctuary Kitchen chef Abir. Guests will also enjoy a reception of traditional Syrian dishes featuring recipes from the cookbook, "Our Syria, Recipes from Home," prepared by Sanctuary Kitchen Chefs.
